BATTLE OF THE BLADDERWORT

Everybody who has used Lost Mine Lake knows of the problem that exists there with the Bladderwort plant. It grows rapidly during the warm months and continually

threatens to take over the lake. Its roots are in the lake bottom, but then as it grows the stem breaks off and the plant floats freely around the lake and continues to grow. It is very difficult to physically remove it, as when wet it is very heavy. This past summer we tried controlling its growth with a combination of removal and chemicals. This was partially successful. After much discussion, the Board of Directors decided to try an approach that we heard worked fairly well back in the '80s and early '90s.

It was also recommended by an outside expert whom I consulted. This approach was to partially drain the lake and then remove as much of the Bladderwort roots as possible from the exposed areas. We heard that there was actually a drain pipe buried deep under the outlet creek. Unfortunately, nobody knew where the control valve was located and the pipe was buried under many feet of silt. We decided to dig a new trench as deep as possible, drain down the lake and install a new pipe, with the valve being located where we could access it in later years. When we found the old pipe it was packed with silt, so finding the valve would not have helped anyway.

The project was undertaken by Board members Doug Gloff, Larry Marvin and Harry Wander. Jimmy LeFrancois, who was not even a member, contributed a huge amount of effort to the project. We rented a large 4 wheel drive backhoe. This was operated by Jimmy, thus saving the expense of hiring somebody to do it. A trench, 200 feet long, and eight feet deep at the lake end, was dug

from the lake to the culvert. This lowered the lake level about 6 feet. Jimmy then used his father's somewhat smaller backhoe to put some finishing touches to the

job. A 4 inch PVC pipe was then laid in the ditch from the lake to the culvert. Jimmy then partially refilled the trench. A great deal of sand and gravel is carried into that gully from the Gas Canyon Road area during the winter months and will gradually fill it the rest of the way.

The next step in the project, scheduled for next week, will be to remove as many of the Bladderwort roots as we can, by removing the top layer of the soil in which they are implanted. The removal will be primarily by Jimmy using their family's equipment, with the rest of us

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providing the shovel work. After that step is completed, the valve in the drain pipe will be closed and the coming rains will refill the lake. Next spring we will again use chemicals aggressively as there will still be many roots we were unable to remove. However, since it grows most vigorously in shallow water, and that is where we will have removed a lot of the roots, the magnitude of the problem will have been significantly lessened.

Draining and cleaning the lake can be repeated as often as needed, now that a new drain pipe is installed and the valve location accurately recorded.

Keeping Lost Mine Lake clear of Bladderwort appears to be a never-ending battle.

Cascade Shores Community Septic Plant Being Proposed

Nevada County has come up with a solution to reduce the excessive sewer rates many in our community are forced to pay. We currently pay one of the highest rates in California to operate our existing sewage treatment plant. Due to the increasing environmental standards that the sewage plant is required to meet, the cost of maintaining it has continued to soar. Even with all the expense put into the plant, currently it still does not meet standards. Many of you may have received a letter in the mail from Nevada County describing the project. In the proposal, the County plans to decommission the existing Cascade Shores Wastewater Treatment Facility, and instead direct wastewater flows to a new community septic system. Construction will consist of two 20,000 gallon tanks, a lift station, conveyance forcemain, motor control center, emergency generator, leachate tanks, and a leach field consisting of buried 7,700 feet of PVC pipe. The site is on 40 acres bordered by Mountain View Drive, Pasquale Road, and Pacific Close (APN: 38-570-04). The project has been identified to reduce the cost of operation for the Cascade Shores Residents while improving water quality.

Supervisor Nate Beason will schedule a meeting with interested homeowners to lay out the plans for the new system and to answer questions from homeowners who are sewer users and any interested parties who are not.

The following is a copy of a letter sent to the Nevada County Department of Public Works from the CSHA Board voicing our concerns about the Community Septic Plant proposal.

Dear Mr. Garcia;


The Cascade Shores Homeowner's Association Board has reviewed the Cascade Shores Community Leach Field Project Initial Study Report, and we have discussed it at our recent board meeting. I'd like to start by thanking you for your efforts to alleviate the excess cost burden the current sewer treatment plant has brought upon our community. We realize that the current plant is not up to standards, and that something needs to be done to stop the escalating costs associated with it. We are not adverse to the construction of the Community Septic and Leach Field in our community to bring down costs as long as we can be assured that there will not be an adverse environmental impact for our community. The Mitigated Negative Declaration did not appear to address the possibility of ground water contamination. The report stated that the project would not deplete ground water supplies or interfere with ground water recharge, but there was no mention of its possible adverse effect on ground water quality. With 14,000 gallons of waste water flowing through 7,700 feet of leach lines, the possibility exists that the waste water could seep through the soil and contaminate the underground water aquifer in our community. Many of our residents have wells, and have expressed concerns about their ground water quality being negatively impacted by the project. The second concern/question that we have is regarding future expandability of the community septic project once built. In the report it was stated that the project is being built to accommodate the 88 or so properties currently required to be on the system. Should future properties be required to be on the system due to septic failure or new construction, will the project be able to accommodate them?

To address our concerns regarding the environmental impact to our community we request that a full Environmental Impact Report (EIR) be done. To address our ground water concerns we request that a Ground Water Study be conducted. Thank you for your consideration of our concerns,

Fire Safety Update - Fall 2013

From this picture, we can see that we live in a beautiful forest. But it's become so thick that you can't see the houses anymore. There is danger within that beauty – the risk that these trees, denser and drier than ever, could some day catch fire. If that happens, we'd "be toast."



At last April's general meeting, there was overwhelming support for improved fire safety in Cascade Shores following a talk by Joanne Drummond from the Nevada County Fire Safe Council.

A committee of interested people was formed, and we started working toward the implementation of the nationally recognized FIREWISE model with the support of the Fire Safe Council. Please see cascadeshores.org and click on Fire Safe Council to learn more about the FIREWISE movement and the vision for our community.

A large piece of this program has to do with education: getting residents and owners in Cascade Shores up-to-date in regard to learning about fire safety in a woodland environment, identifying local resources and people who can help with questions and safety improvements, and understanding the laws and other legal requirements that impose expectations on all of us.

However, the busy fire season has held up our efforts to arrange an official "assessment" of our problems and exposures from fire authorities. Additionally, a community fire safety education day scheduled for the firehouse property, has been delayed for the same reason. As a result, many of the planned "30 Day Clean-Up Notices" will be pushed into next year. It's important that we do our part to get out as much information as possible as the first step.

To date, the Firewise Committee has:

- 1. Placed fire safety signs and reminders throughout the community.
- 2. Mailed a first letter, announcing FIREWISE, to over 500 property owners.
- 3. Received fire safety training from the Fire Safe Council, fire officials, and insurance representatives.
- 4. Helped conduct courtesy safety inspections in the field.
- 5. Participated in fire safety canvassing of properties within Cascade Shores.
- 6. Upgraded the cascadeshores.org website to include all FIREWISE information (under the heading of Fire Safe Council.)
- 7. Notified, by mail, more than 80 vacant lot owners of the need to clean-up any dangerous, untended properties. (Some of these places have not been touched in years.)

If you would like help in evaluating potential fire dangers on your property, members of the Firewise Committee are available to visit, discuss risks, and provide you with a written report. This is simply an informational report as a courtesy to you and CSHA membership is not required.

Please do your part to learn about FIREWISE and support our work. The first step is to take a honest look at your own property and ask yourself if it would pass inspection. If not, you need to set a goal for yourself and get started with cleaning up. Small improvements, over time, will yield big results. Many property owners have already gotten a good start, and we commend your efforts.


