Roads and Environment

April 25th at the county building 10:30 am. Arrived with Aelene Oslin, Bob Hoge, and my self, (Dave Schrack). Met with Michael Hill-Weld, Director of Nevada County D.O.T, Ken Ribble County Yard Supervisor and his assistant Richard.

FIRST SUBJECT: Chip and Seal the roads in Cascade Shores. The road work of this nature will be done sometime in the middle of May 2001. There will be required tree and shrub trimming before this work begins. This trimming will be done by the Nevada County D.O.T. The area to be trimmed, is the easement around your properties. (e.g. the gutter area and the over hanging tree limbs that are in the way of the truck beds when they are raised.) This requires a height of 15 ft from the street surface and approx. 4 ft from the street into the easement. If you have concerns about the trees or shrubs in front of your properties that have to be cut out. Direct your Ouestions to: Ken Ribble 1-530-265-7197.

SECOUND SUBJECT: NID Trucks carrying large pipe sections will not be using Pasquale road during the Quaker hill closure. Questions or Concerns on this matter: Call: Tim McCall 1-530-273-6185, Ext. 260

THIRD SUBJECT: School Bus Transportation. The families that use the School Bus Pick-up Point at Banner-Quaker Hill for the two week period of road closure will be required to use Pasquale Road. The pick-up point is yet to be determined.




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News From Cascade Shores Women's Club



The Good 'Ol Days by Cathy Stojanovich

I'm Cathy Stojanovich and I do remember some of the "good old days" at Cascade Shores. My memories go back to the early spring of 1965.

It started when my parents, Alice and John Peters, invited me, my husband Al and our (almost 2 year old) daughter Sandy to meet them at Cascade Shores to see the lot they had just purchased. To get to Cascade Shores at that time, we drove up highway 20 to The Five Mile House - drove down to the lake (Scotts Flat) and then across the dam and up a very steep dirt road that came into Pasquale. Of course none of the roads in the development were paved. They were so proud of their "find". Our first question to them was "how did you ever find this place"? (My parents lived in Redwood City at the time and my father worked in San Francisco and we lived in Cupertino, Ca.) They had always talked about wanting to build a cabin for their leisure time and also for their children and grandchildren to enjoy, so when my Dad saw an ad in the San Francisco Chronicle for this property he decided to investigate. They fell in love with the area and didn't waste any time to fulfill their dream.


In August of that same year they moved into their new cabin. (They were one of the first to build in the area) AI, Sandy, our new 6 week old son, Steven and myself helped them on "moving day". That was an interesting ride in on Pasquale with a big rental moving truck. You had to stay back about 1/2 a block (with the other car) so you didn't get blinded by the cloud of dirt thrown out by the truck in front of you. That was the beginning of "ye ole' homestead" at 15509 Cascade Drive.

The old wooden flume used to run right behind their property (we used to fish in it and actually caught a few now and then) and then as it crossed the road at the corner of Pasquale and Cascade Drive it was a huge wooden structure about 15 feet (?) high. To run the electricity in the cabin we had a gas generator - which made for fun nights when it would run out of gas and you would have to grab a flash light and run outside to refill it. My parents got snowed in one time for 3 or 4 days. They didn't have a four wheel drive car and the roads were not cleared regularly because there weren't enough people living there full time, so they had to wait until the PG & E crew came out to check on "whatever it was they checked on" in the area, every 3 or 4 days. Then my parents drove out following the tracks from the PG & E truck. They also didn't have a phone for a while. The winter months always made for an interesting ride in on Pasquale. (Quaker Hill Road was almost non-existent) slipping and sliding in the mud or on the icy mud.

As our children grew, they used to fish in "the little lake" (aka as "the diggins") when there was a little wooden bridge across it. My parents collected petrified wood from the "diggins" and that is what the fireplace is made of in the cabin. We also remember during the drought years, (I think it was the late 70's) when Scotts Flat was so low you could walk (and we did) on the lake bottom in some places. What was really scary was to see how deep the lake was where my children would swim (right next to where the boat ramp is now).

My Dad passed away in 1987 and my Mom in 1993 but their dream lives on in this great little place called Cascade Shores. The cabin is now owned by me and my husband, Al and my sister Judy and her husband Joe and is shared with our two families. It's hard to believe that today, our children are now bringing their children to enjoy the "dream" of my parents - four generations WOW! There has been many changes and I'm sure there will more.
