Security Patrol

 Following the resignation of Irv Stark in August, Don Himenes assumed the security position on the CSHA Board of Directors. Steve Foxe has joined the patrol and shares the route with Don. In gated communities such as Lake Wildwood where homeowners' dues are mandatory and high, the Security Patrol has the authority to enforce Covenants and Restrictions and other infractions of the rules. However, in Cascade Shores, where joining the Homeowners Association is optional and the dues nominal, enforcement is in the hands of county agencies. Our patrol is in place to watch over homes that are vacant, and to respond to your requests to come onto your property to check doors and windows for a specified period of time.

Our patrol persons have forms that indicate how to report possible non-compliance and will be happy to assist you in filling them out. The visibility of Don and Steve as they drive their rounds in their marked vehicles is a deterrent to vandalism and other unwholesome activities.

The Board has considered changing the name of the Security Patrol to something more user friendly to residents, but still intimidating to mischief-makers. Suggestions?

Please be sure to notify Don or Steve if you have any specific concerns regarding the security of your property.

Government Agency Liaison Subcommittee

Concerns of Cascade Shores residents have been voiced to Peter Van Zant, Nevada County Supervisor for District 1.

1. Lack of a passable road out of Cascade Shores to the East in the event of a wildfire blowing from the west, along with lack of road signs identifying a route.
2. Egress route over the Scotts Flat Lake dam.
3. The need for reflectors on Quaker Hill Road through Deer Creek Park on top of the ridge.
4. Paving the gravel portion of the recently straightened and widened Banner Quaker Hill Road
5. Enforcement of a weed/brush abatement program for empty lots.

Supervisor Van Zant has represented Cascade Shores well and agreed to support us in our present concerns. He arranged a meeting with Nevada County Director of Transportation and Sanitation, Michael Hill-Weld and his staff on October 10, 2002. The meeting went well.

The highest priority (for Shores residents) is improvement of a Quaker Hill – Chalk Bluff route to Highway 20 for egress in case of a wildfire coming from the west. The County Transportation staff preliminary estimate is around one million dollars to improve the existing route into a two lane, gravel road. Primary financing will be obtained through grant monies. Because of national interest in the increasing problem of wildfires, grant money is reasonably obtainable for this kind of project. The County staff has agreed to join us in this project with Supervisor Van Zant acting as coordinator. There is much work to be done and a task force is being assembled to tackle it.

The emergency route over the NID Scotts Flat Lake Dam road came in for discussion. Jim Kain will pursue with the

NID Board of Directors through our representative Nancy Weber the subject of the availability of a key to open the locked gate on the Shores side of the lake and possible improvement of the road condition.

The reflector installation for Quaker Hill over the ridge is on the County job list; grant money is being sought to cover the cost. If the grant request is successful the reflectors will be installed in 2004.

Paving of Banner Quaker Hill Road is held up for safety reasons. It is felt paving would attract heavier traffic from our area (including commercial traffic such as logging trucks) wanting access to Grass Valley and Highways 174 and 49 southward. Currently this road funnels traffic down Idaho Maryland crossing Brunswick at a dangerous corner. Idaho Maryland parallels the Loma Rica ranch development project and we understand the project developers have agreed to consider making a route available so that Idaho Maryland traffic could access or cross Brunswick at a safer point further north.

Laws are already on the books regarding weed and/or brush abatement. The Nevada County Consolidated Fire District is successfully enforcing the law. If growth on vacant property is considered a hazard the owner is given notices. If the property is not cleaned up (which most owners do themselves), Consolidated has a contractor do the work. The contractor is reimbursed by the County and the County places a lien on the property. This matter will be pursued for our area through the 49er Fire Protection District.

Our October focus was planting the daffodils along Quaker Hill Road. We had some 500 daffodils planted when Nevada Irrigation District (NID) started its Cascade Flume Project. In August of 2000 the Cascade Shores Women's Club (CSWC) wrote to NID regarding the daffodils. Bob Brennan became our gardening consultant. He helped us draft a proposal to get a cost estimate that we presented to NID and they sent us funds to replant daffodils. NID requested that we wait until this fall to plant the bulbs.

Last spring you may have noticed a sole survivor of our daffodils. It will no longer be alone. We planted 400 daffodil bulbs at the bottom of the 31% grade.

Dot Kain was the able coordinator of the event helped by Bob Brennan and Denise Cain. Dot even arranged for NID to water the area before the planting.

We had an eventful summer with the Spaghetti Feed (see p. 6), basket raffle, Triathlon (see p. 8), and on-going interest groups.

To make amends after all the construction mess on the steep hill at the CS entryway, NID gave CSWC a check for \$500 to pay for late-blooming daffodils and soil amendments. The pipeline construction project had ruined the daffodil planting that volunteers had worked on in prior years.

My role in 2001 was to work with NID's representative and prepare the fund grant request. In prior years I paid for many of the bulbs. I'm a daffodil nut! I recommended a special late-blooming variety which avoids most of our snow. By spring 2003, the entry to the Shores should be a glorious carpet of yellow blooms!

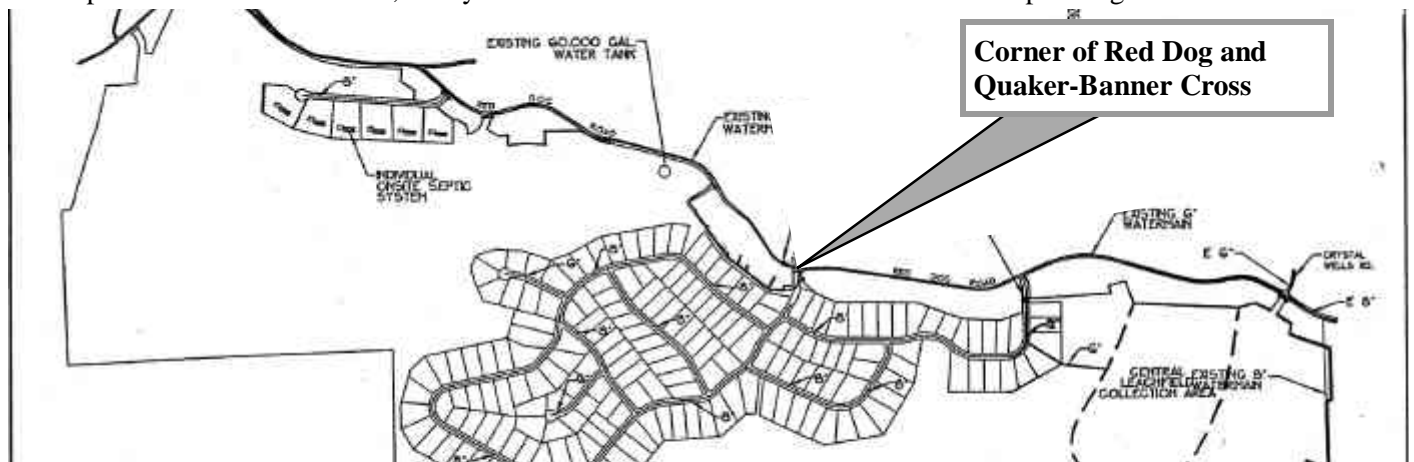

Deer Creek Park—Two *Sylvia Pichitino, Deer Creek Park*

Greetings from Deer Creek Park. Our neighborhoods may not share backyards, but just about all of us travel the same roads everyday and we would undoubtedly share some of the impact of Terra Alta Development Company's proposed subdivision--Deer Creek Park—Two. (DCP2). The proposal calls for 193 clustered residential lots south of Red Dog Road. 193 new homes would mean 400-500 new residents and about 1900 additional vehicle trips each day.

In the current proposal, access to DCP2 would be from Red Dog Road. The junction of Quaker Hill Cross Road and Red Dog Road would be turned into 4-way intersection. DCP2 residents would turn right off Red Dog at Quaker Hill. The second road into DCP2 would be about a quarter mile further up Red Dog. There are already thousands of vehicle trips on Red Dog Road and Boulder Street each day. Can we withstand nearly 2000 more?

So far, more than 230 residents who live near or travel Red Dog Road and Boulder Street have signed a letter of concern about the proposal for DCP2 and feel there are serious problems related to traffic, safety and health.

Sunday, September 29th, brought residents of Nugget St. and South Pasquale Rd. together for a Pot Luck Block Party hosted by the Kain, Foxe and Barber families. It provided an opportunity for neighbors to get reacquainted, catch up on busy lives, meet newcomers and share in delicious food.

We were fortunate to have Special Guests Lt. Tom Carrington and Deputy Frank Koehler from the Nevada County Sheriff's Office and Director David Hanson, Battalion Chief David Ray and Engineer Pat Sullivan from the 49er Fire Protection District speak with the 28 neighbors who attended. They supplied us with very interesting and useful information and, as a result, we will participate in a Neighborhood Watch Program.

Everyone had a good time and we look forward to making this an annual event.

About 1900 more daily trips would increase congestion, air pollution, noise, accidents, and add to the hazards of winter driving. In the case of a wildfire, emergency access and resident evacuation could be compromised. The location and direction of a wildfire could block any of the few roads out and each route has limited capacity.

187 DCP2 homes would use a STEP sewage disposal system-septic tank effluent pumped uphill to an 18-acre leach field. The planned leach field is precariously close to Little Deer Creek, a source for Nevada City's raw water supply.

The Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) has been delayed while the Nevada County Transportation Commission completes an updated traffic study. The Draft EIR may be finished in December or early 2003. The Nevada County Planning Commission will then schedule a public hearing. The 8th Annual Barbara Schmidt Millar "Celebration of Life" Women's Triathlon was held on Sunday, September 15, 2002 to benefit the Barbara Schmidt Millar Memorial Fund at the Breast Imaging Center of SNMH and the BSM Memorial Scholarship at NUHS.

It was a truly heart-warming, incredible event with about 340 participants: 140 triathletes, 51 teams of either 2 or 3 members, and about 52 walk/runners. The local homeowners were totally supportive, the volunteers were awesome, and the event ran like a dream.

I heard so many moving stories that day and in the days preceding...cancer survivors who were doing it, families surrounding them with love. Folks who had lost someone to cancer and were doing it in memory. Other disabilities were obvious; a swimmer who suffered a debilitating stroke 5 years ago competing on a team for the 2nd year in a row, another swimmer with a knee brace from her ankle

to her mid-thigh who also raised over \$2,000. There were three pregnant women, grandmothers and great-grandmothers. Our 2 oldest walkers were 79 and 81. A family of 5 sisters and their mom walking for the one sister just finishing her chemo...still bald, but smiling and walking! My dear friend battling lung cancer who couldn't participate this year but who came to cheer us all on! The women who have mentored and sponsored others are making a huge impact for women's fitness inside and outside of our community.

We're still counting the donations, entry fees, sponsorships, but are close to \$21,000 net right now. Thank you ALL for continuing to support this event by opening your roads to cyclists and runners and your lake to all the swimmers. All the hard work and organization pays off on the day of the event with REWARDS beyond belief for everyone.

Bird Feeding Station

I made a wonderful addition to my bird feeding station about this time last year, a fine mesh net bag filled with Nyjer thistle.

I hung it on the clothesline and attracted lots of Lesser Goldfinches and Pine Siskins.

The finch is a greenish backed bird with a plain yellow breast, with the males getting bright yellow in summer.

The siskins have a heavily streaked breast with a brownish back and considerable yellow in the wings.

The birds force their tiny beaks through the fine mesh and extract a single Nyjer thistle seed. If you watch closely you will see them adjust the shell in the bill, crack it, pull out the seed with their tiny tongue, and spit out the shell.

If the bag is hung over a desk there will accumulate a feathery layer of debris of cracked shells, with a hundred of them not filling half a teaspoon.

For some strange reason the finches seem to eat facing up, and the siskins facing down.

At times the jay will try and fail to force their large beaks through the mesh, but locate the bag carefully as the squirrels will rip it open if they can get to it.

The bird feeder bags are available at Wild Birds and other stores, but be sure to get the fine mesh, as the little Nyjer thistle seed will fall right out of the coarse mesh bags.

The finches stay all year, but the siskins seem to head for higher elevations in summer. If the bag gets wet and stiff, simply crush it gently with your hands and you and the birds are back in business.

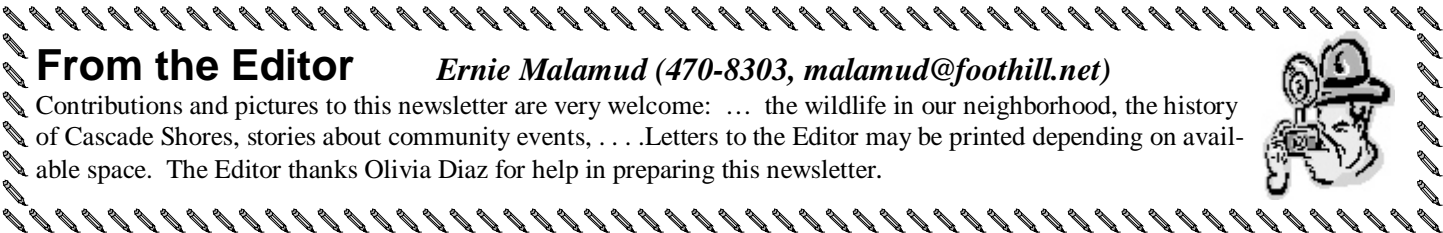

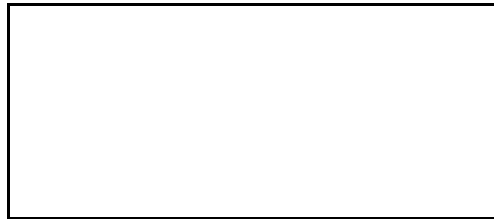
remain more tangible if we, in turn, express our gratitude by some tribute to his dedicated hard work.
